TEN TIPS FOR HELPING A CHILD LEARN THE ALPHABET

- 1. Beginning as early as possible, read alphabet books with your child.
- 2. Do alphabet puzzles together.
- 3. Sing the alphabet song on car rides, at bath time, or when walking.
- 4. Once your child is fairly familiar with reciting the alphabet, try alternating letters. You say A, let them say B, and so on. Then repeat, this time having them say the first letter and you saying the second. For extra fun, time yourselves and see if you can beat your time.
- 5. Point out letters as you see them when you are out and about (McDonald's has a big M, Wendy's has a W, Kroger has a K, Target has a T, S-T-O-P on a stop sign, etc.)
- 6. Work on naming the letters in the child's name and the first letters in the names of family members.
- 7. Print, cut out, and use the letter cards on the following pages to arrange into an alphabet arc. Place A at the beginning, M in the center and Z at the end. Help your child fill in the rest. When completed, have your child touch each letter as you say the alphabet together. (This will help them match the print to the song.)
- 8. Use the cards to match uppercase to lowercase.
- 9. Make your own sand tray or use shaving foam to let them practice writing the letters with their finger or a pencil (eraser end might work best!).
- 10. Whatever you do, keep it fun!
